

The Start Smart team has been meeting with the local colleges to implement the Program into their curriculum.


We have seen success with CSEB, and possibly St. Mary's in Moraga, but the Maritime Academy could not commit at this time.



Feather River Cases to Move Forward

For four years, AAUW has supported three lawsuits against Feather River



In November 2012, the Plumas County Superior Court overturned the SPB's ruling, siding with the SPB judge and the plaintiffs, and asked the full SPB to reconsider the complaints. The SPB could appeal the decision; however, the plaintiffs' lawyer hopes the decision by the Plumas County Superior Court will lead to a successful conclusion of the cases in the future.

(Scene 3 -- Kay Ernst)






A PIECE OF AAUW HISTORY

(Thank you to Muriel Fry for finding this)

In 1885, AAUW published its first research report, "The Health Statistics of Women College Graduates." This was a survey of 1,290 AAUW members regarding the impact of higher education on women's health and physical education. Published by the Massachusetts Bureau of Statistics of Labor. AAUW's research established that. contrary to statements being made by a Harvard physician at the time, education did not adversely affect women's health. Among other purported negative effects, the report debunked the notion that college education would cause women to become infertile.

In 2011, two copies of the report were rediscovered in the AAUW archives by the Archives Task Force, a committed team of AAUW members from across the country. Due to the age of the reports and the highly acidic paper on which they were printed, the pages were becoming brittle and the binding loose. In order to prevent further deterioration and ensure that they are protected for the future, they are now undergoing treatment by a professional conservator. When the conservation is complete, they will be returned to the AAUW archives.
