On January 8, 2012, I saw in the Contra Costa Times an article "the Globalist Quiz---Africa by 2100" about Africa's population problem. This article supports AAUW's belief in the importance of education:

"Africa will likely not quadruple to surpass Asia's current population level (4.2 billion) during this century. High population growth, in Africa and elsewhere, is not just a function of lack of access to family planning, but even more so a consequence of taking girls out of school prematurely. The best restraint on uncontrolled population growth actually is to ensure young women's access to education."

These three dynamic speakers will discuss various aspects of HUMAN TRAFFICKING:

Jennifer Alderete, Special Agent for Homeland Security Investigations, is currently assigned to the Human Trafficking and Smuggling Group where she investigates sex and labor trafficking cases. She will talk about the criminal laws involved and how law enforcement and other non-government agencies work together.

Cindy Liou is a staff attorney with Asian Pacific Islander Legal Outreach (API Legal Outreach) and coordinates the Human Trafficking Project at the agency. Since 2000, API Legal Outreach continues to engage in legislative and policy advocacy on behalf of trafficking survivors from over 22 countries (Asia, Mexico, Central and South America, Africa, and Europe), as well as provide comprehensive and holistic direct legal and social services to men, women, transgendered, and children survivors of human trafficking. She will discuss how to work with survivors of human trafficking, and social and legal services needed by trafficking survivors.

Caritas Foster is with Holy Family Sisters and has dedicated her ministry to educating the public on trafficking. She is a member of Cross Bay Collaborative which was recently funded by the Office of Refugee Resettlement of the Federal Department of Health and Human Services. She will suggest some practical ways for the general public to help victims of the trafficking.

A state Department report states that 14,000 cases of Human Trafficking were reported in the US in 2009.

California is one of the largest destination states with 43% of international trafficking taking place here.
