

Through the Inter Branch Council, the \$tart \$mart program is now in the process of being implemented at three local campuses of Higher Education. Saint Mary's College, Cal State East Bay Contra Costa, and The Maritime Academy in Benicia are all prospective sites to begin conducting classes on salary negotiation strategies for recent graduates. At this time, three Branches are involved with the \$\$ program here in Contra Costa County. Orinda-Moraga-Lafayette, Pleasant Hill-Martinez, and Concord, have trained members ready to begin conducting classes. Marilyn and I are very excited to begin meeting with students and faculty members. We want to thank Deana Vick Davidson (OML), and Elaine Groen and Jean Simutis (Concord) for initiating the project last year and getting Annie Houle from the WAGE PROJECT out to California to train us.

As an AAUW member, you can help by asking the newly, or about to be employed, if they negotiated their salary. If not, direct them to wageproject.org for some helpful tips on how to get the best offer possible. It is no mistake that women make far less than men in a lifetime, but it is a mistake to let it continue.





Do you know how mainstream media portrays women?? Would you be shocked to learn that women in positions of power and influence are under-represented? Are you aware that the collective message from our media is that a woman's power lies in her youth, beauty and sexuality? Jennifer Siebel Newsom wrote, directed and produced a film on this very subject, which premiered at the 2011 Sundance Film Festival. The film features provocative interviews with politicians, journalists, entertainers, activists and academics, while gathering facts and statistics about the persuasive force our media has in shaping cultural norms. Teenage girls tell their stories and the resounding message is that a woman's value is NOT in her capacity as a leader.

The film is *Miss Representation* and will have two showings in our area sponsored by our sister AAUW branches. The Benicia-Vallejo AAUW branch is partnering with a coalition of educational and service community organizations to host a **free** screening at California Maritime Academy's Rizza Auditorium in Vallejo on Thursday, September 20th at 7 pm. A panel discussion will follow exploring the ways women can overcome gender-based societal and institutional barriers. In Lafayette, the screening of the film will be at the Lafayette-Orinda Presbyterian Church at 49 Knox Drive on Sunday, September 23rd at 4 pm. This showing, too, will be followed by a discussion. This event has an admission charge of \$10/person. You can register at www.lopc.org.

Six college & university campuses have joined AAUW as partner members since July 1. Congratulations for great recruiting.

A Message from the AAUW President (edited for brevity)

It's back-to-school time, at least according to advertisers. The sales are everywhere, even though it feels like summer just started yesterday. Most of us are also seeing lots of political advertisements, too. Now that Congress is in summer recess, not to return to our nation's capital until after Labor Day, campaigns are in full swing in anticipation of the November elections.

The AAUW Action Fund's "It's My Vote: I Will be Heard" campaign and back to school are merging in a very important way. Why? Because AAUW branches nationwide have adopted the effective tactic of attending college freshman orientations, fall new student events, move-in days, and other activities to ensure these newly relocated millennials are registered to vote.

This is very happy marriage between voter registration and college campuses. According to HigherEdJobs, the federal Higher Education Act requires that registration materials be readily accessible on college and university campuses. Many colleges now promote web pages to help students register. They've also provided some other great ideas for registering students that our AAUW states and branches could easily adopt, such as:

- * Include voter registration information and forms in "welcome packages" for newly-admitted students, and make voting information visible in college dorms and university classrooms.
- * Hand out voting information to students as they wait in line for their college ID photos (we all remember how long that line can be!). Some college administrators shaking hands in those lines ask, "Are you registered to vote?" which can be especially helpful. Apparently administrators and professors are even more persuasive in getting young people to register than we are!

Our friends at the Brennan Center also have state-specific information critical to students. Other guidance, consistent with federal requirements under the Higher Education Act, can help you pitch these ideas to your local campuses. In this way, AAUW is providing a real service to our college/university partners, both recruiting more of them and helping the millennial generation have a real impact this fall.
