Since 2010, California has conducted 44 **Start Smart Wage Negotiation** Classes to 22 Universities. The first school to offer the class was in Livermore's Los Positas Community College. Since that time, with the help of AAUW members, the 74 College/University Campus Partners and its 102 AAUW Campus Representatives have worked diligently to get the information on **Equal Pay for Equal Work** out to the college community.

Legal Advocacy Fund

The U.S. Supreme Court released many important decisions in its most recent term, and two of those decisions will negatively affect the rights of Americans in the workplace. In [Vance v. Ball State University](#), the court made it easier for employers to escape liability for discrimination and harassment in the workplace. This decision means workers will now have a much harder time proving workplace harassment and discrimination under [Title VII](#) of the Civil Rights Act. *AAUW opposes limits on a worker's ability to seek remedies for harassment and discrimination and we are working with Congress to address this issue through legislation.*

In another case, [University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center v. Nassar](#), the court ruled that one of Title VII's protections for claims of discrimination based on sex, race, or religion did not apply to retaliation claims. Under this ruling, plaintiffs alleging retaliation must meet stricter requirements in order to prove their case. AAUW is working with Congress to restore this worker protection. **These are just two of the stories that demonstrate LAF's essential work. What's in a name?? If you've been an AAUW member for several years, you will remember EF (Educational Foundation) and LAF (Legal Advocacy Foundation) as separate entities. Now both, as well as others, are under one umbrella ~ AAUW Funds.

When you contribute to Funds, you can designate where you want your dollars to go. Besides Educational Opportunities (#9110) and LAF (#3999), you can designate to the Eleanor Roosevelt Fund (#9170), Leadership Programs Fund (#4339) or Public Policy (#4337).

The Eleanor Roosevelt Fund publishes research reports such as *Why So Few? Women in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics*. This



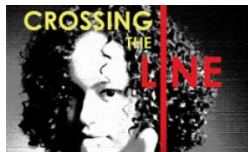
important publication was partially funded by a memorial fund for our own Letitia Corum, a long time AAUW member

(Martinez Branch) and AAUW-CA officer.

Other important publications include *Behind the Pay Gap* and *Crossing the Line: Sexual Harassment at School*. Both of these research reports are used by educational institutions

AAUW Funds Reach Far and Wide **High School Teachers: Register for AAUW's Gender Studies Symposium**

Our *Crossing the Line* research report



shows that teaching gender studies in high school can reduce the incidence of sexual harassment. But teachers

who currently do so are operating in a vacuum and need a network to exchange best practices. And those who want to teach gender studies need information on how to introduce this game-changing topic into their curriculum. Join us in St. Louis on October 26 as we bring together educators, administrators, and resource providers to discuss how we can create classrooms of justice.
