A Conversation with Our School Superintendents

Education, both locally and statewide, will be the topic at the November Branch Meeting when Superintendents Rami Muth and Dr. Nellie Meyer talk about the successes and the issues facing Martinez Unified and Mt. Diablo Unified school districts.

The meeting will be held on **Thursday, November 13th at 7 p.m.** to accommodate the schedules of the busy district leaders. The Martinez Unified School District board room at 922 Susana Street will be the location. The talk will begin at 7:15 after a short business meeting. The public will be invited to attend.

Each superintendent will give a brief survey of the successes and challenges in their districts and the transition to the common core state standards and the impact this has for teaching and learning. There will be time for questions on these and other issues in education including those strongly supported by AAUW members.

"I am truly looking forward to this event and sharing information about the exciting work we are doing," Ms. Muth said recently, noting that she and Dr. Meyer have a very good working relationship and talk quite often.

Directions: From Alhambra Avenue, turn right on Jones at the fire station, drive two blocks and turn left on Estudillo and then right on Susana. The building is on the left beyond the park.

From Pacheco Boulevard, drive north past the S curve when Pacheco becomes Pine Street and take the first left which is Susana Street. The building will be on the right in the second block.

From 680, take the Marina Vista off ramp and turn left. At the bottom of the hill overlooking downtown Martinez, turn left on Court Street and follow the street past the jail where it becomes Pine Street and turn right on Susana. If you reach the S curve, you've gone too far.

WHERE DO YOU STAND?

This past June a group of students and parents, backed by a Silicon Valley millionaire, filed a suit against the state of California (Vergara v. California). The suit stated that the laws governing tenure deprived students of a decent education by leaving bad teachers in place. Judge Rolf Treu of Los Angeles Superior Court ruled that teacher tenure laws deprive students of their right to an education under the State Constitution and violates their civil rights. In his ruling he wrote "The evidence is compelling. Indeed it shocks the conscience."

The decision struck a blow to teachers' unions who maintain that tenure is a necessary protection for teachers. They plan to appeal the judge's ruling. Governor Brown and other state officials who are named in the suit have already filed their appeals.

While both sides are working to present their evidence when the case again comes to court, the California ruling has reverberated in other parts of the country with groups in New York, Connecticut, Oregon, and states that have similar tenure statutes, planning to mount their own attacks.

Currently the law in California remains unchanged, pending the out come in future court actions.

It seems certain that more will be heard of this controversy as we face the November election. In the one debate agreed to by Governor Brown and his opponent Neel Kashkari, Mr. Kashkari attacked the Governor's backing of the status quo, saying that Governor Brown was siding with the unions at the expense of students. It remains to be seen how big a role the tenure fight will play in the election and it will be interesting to see how the sides stack up; who will be for the current tenure law and which of our elected officials will be against.

The Big News this year is that \$tart \$mart Classes will now be run through AAUW in Washington DC.

Annie Houle and Dorrie Sieburg, formerly of The WAGE Project, will continue to head up the program that offers salary negotiation classes to graduating college students. Evelyn Murphy, the founder of WAGE will become a consultant for the project.

We have been told except for a few changes, such as Logo, some job titles, and a tweaking of the PowerPoint, \$tart \$mart Classes will retain the same format.

In the past 3 years **\$tart \$mart** has been offered to colleges in all 50 states. Here in Northern California, we have seen our AAUW members teach and present the classes to well over 15 local colleges. When licensing cost was a factor, branches help pave the way. Last month Elaine Groen of AAUW Concord and I met with Inter Branch Council, (IBC) to propose that the nine branches in Contra Costa County combine to purchase a three year license for the Contra Costa Community College District, (CCCCD). After meeting with AAUW member, Chancellor Helen Benjamin, we determined that one license could be used to accommodate students at the three main campuses of DVC, Las Lomas and West Contra Costa. The cost to each branch would be about \$63 a year or \$189 over three years,

We pointed out several reasons to take on this challenge.

- The students were more likely to be from our local high schools and our friends and neighbors.
- In the near future, some community colleges are looking to give four year degrees.
- AAUW would have a new presence in the community supporting Equal Pay for Equal Work.
- AAUW membership could benefit through the College Partner online membership program.

IBC members are going to talk to their branches and let us know at the November 18th meeting. So far three branches have said yes.
