PBS will present "Spotlight Education," during the week of September 12-17. This is a special week of programing, during primetime, which will present reports featuring America's students, and new models of learning. President and CEO of PBS, Paula Kerger, states that, "Spotlight Education, highlights public media's focus on education and our role in convening conversations around how to improve outcomes for students." Special on-air programming will include resources to support teachers. Interactive content modules and a social hub will also be featured during the week. More than 100 public television and radio stations will join with over 1,700 partners in 49 states, to publish stories of students all over the United States, as well as the adults who are responsible for helping them achieve success. Eleven films and documentaries will be aired on local PBS stations, during the week of September 12-17. A special broadcast of the 5th annual American Graduation Day, will end the week. This presentation will celebrate and highlight individuals and non-profits that have been responsible for keeping students focused on graduating from high school. Following the week in September, a year-long campaign, "Teach Boldly," will be led by PBS and local member stations. There will be a variety of virtual and community training events, and a digital space called PBS Teachers' Lounge. "Teachers will be able to share ideas, learn from their peers, and access tools and resources that can be implemented in their classrooms." All the above mentioned programs will be available on the PBS app for both iOS and Android devices. Updates of various programs can be accessed through #SpotlightEduPBS and #amgrad on Twitter. "Public media is committed to providing Americans of all ages with educational content for free and commercial free," said Pat Harrison President and CEO, the Corporation for Public Broadcasting." The Corporation for Public Broadcasting provided a majority of the funding for Spotlight Education. PBS has 350 member stations, with 100 million people watching each month, and 33 million access PBS online. PBS is committed to supporting education-at home, in the classroom, and in communities."

AAUW has taken a stand on several of the Propositions on the California Ballot on November 8, 2016.

For your information, they are as follows:

Proposition 51: Support - This is a state school bond to address the multi-billion dollar backlog of school construction projects. These projects have been approved by local school board and must meet state program eligibility criteria. School districts will use local funds to match state dollars.

Proposition 52: Support - A "yes" vote supports requiring voter approval to change the dedicated us of certain fees from hospitals used to draw matching federal money and fund Medi-Cal services. The initiative was also designed to require a two-thirds majority vote of the legislature to end the hospital fee program.

A "no" vote opposes this initiative, allowing the legislature to change, extend, or eliminate the hospital fee program with a majority vote.

The California Legislature would be permitted to amend the hospital fee program via a two-thirds vote, but only when the proposed changes "amend or add provisions that further the purposes of the Act."^[1]

Proposition 53: Oppose - A "yes" vote will be a vote in favor of requiring voter approval before the state could issue more than \$2 billion in public infrastructure bonds that would require an increase in taxes or fees for repayment. A "no" vote will be a vote against the voter approval requirement and in favor of continuing to allow the state to issue new debt without voter approval.

Supporters of Proposition 53 refer to it as the "No Blank Checks Initiative."

Proposition 55: Support - Proposition 55 protects our Students and Public Schools from Returning to the Days of Massive Budget Cuts, Educator Layoffs, Larger Classes and Tuition Hikes

California public school funding was cut to the bone during the recession, forcing more than 30,000 teacher layoffs, huge class sizes, and the elimination of programs like music and art that make our kids well-rounded. Public schools and colleges are just starting to come back from these cuts, and unless we pass Prop. 55 to maintain the current income tax rates on the wealthiest Californians, **our schools will lose \$4 billion a year.**

Furthermore, California is facing a severe teacher shortage. **There is a need to hire more than 22,000 teachers next year alone,** and there is still a need to hire education support professionals like library aides, bus drivers and custodians.

Proposition 58: Support

A "yes" vote is a vote in favor of repealing most of the 1998 Proposition 227, the "English in Public Schools" Initiative, thus effectively allowing non-English languages to be used in public educational instruction.

A "no" vote is a vote **against repealing** most of the "English in Public Schools" Initiative, which was designed to prohibit non-English languages from being used in public schools.

Proposition 58 was sponsored in the California State Legislature by State Senator Ricardo Lara (D-33) as Senate Bill 1174, or the **Multilingual Education for a 21st Century Economy Act**.
