#### Gayle Duncan

Tina Hayes, is the owner of The School of Etiquette and Decorum. For the past decade, Tina has been teaching the basics and finer points of good manners from kindergarteners to college students in the East Bay and beyond. Ms. Hayes enters classrooms dressed stylishly and impeccably groomed. She offers five-to-eight week after school courses, sponsored by school districts and various organizations, so there is no cost to the students. Tina lectures on a variety of topics: polite conversation, party etiquette, gifts, thank you notes, RSVP's, profanity, talking on cellphones too loudly in public places, and saggy pants. She states to the students, "Gentlemen, no one wants to see your underclothes." She also offers instruction, to young men, on how to converse with their date's parents. Tina emphasizes how important first impressions are. She tells the students that, "Strangers will form an opinion about you within seven seconds after the introduction." She instructs youngsters how to express sincere apologies, and the six do's and don'ts of a proper handshake. Ms. Hayes recently gave two Middle School students 30 seconds to arrange a heap of plates and silverware into a proper table setting. Middle School students also will get to test their knowledge of table manners at a four-course dinner Hayes will host at Lone Tree Golf Course in December. Tina equates etiquette with success. She tells the students of her own difficulties in the corporate world. She had no confidence networking or speaking in front of groups; eating in expensive restaurants was intimidating, not knowing her way around a place setting. Tina stresses to students how important it is to learn proper etiquette now, and then they will have that skill set when they reach adulthood. Ms. Hayes' services are important in an age when respect is lacking in many areas. Civility to one another has become a thing of the past. Tina blames prime time TV more than poor parenting. She states, "On TV, everything is sex, rudeness, backstabbing, and cussing, so what can the children learn, if that's all that's in front of them?" Students have signed up for her after school class to "see what etiquette means", and "to pick something in your spare time to do besides watching TV or playing video games." In addition to Antioch, Tina has traveled to Oakley, Pittsburg, Lafayette, Vallejo, Fairfield, Turlock, and Tracy, where her six week class is mandatory at one of the area high schools. Hayes also speaks at the Richmond Police crime prevention activities the department hosts for youth, and visits teens in the Sacramento Police Department's cadet program.


