AAUW FUND REPORT

Jennifer Apkarian and Claudia Bass, AAUW Fund VPs

The response to our solicitation letter has been outstanding. To date, we have received 29 contributions for a total of \$3,520.00. Everyone has been very generous contributing to these funds that are the heart of AAUW.

On October 23 we had the opportunity to participate in an AAUW Fund Event which took the place of the usual AAUW Fund luncheons held in Northern and Southern California. 13 Fellowship recipients presented their projects. This year marks AAUW's 140th anniversary and what better way to celebrate than to see our mission exemplified through these Fellowship recipients. There were two more opportunities to participate in these AAUW Fund Events on October 30 at 10 a.m. and November 7 at 1 p.m.

Seven American Fellowship recipients gave interesting presentations on topics such as Rhetorical Education in the Extracurriculum which trains citizens to engage meaningfully in their community beyond the classroom, looking at the Native American history of Danza and Southwest Powwows in a way that breaks colonial stereotypes and gives them a voice, the Pellagra Pandemic in the Deep South which is a nutritional deficiency of niacin B3 occurring between 1906 and the 1940s with an emphasis on women who fought these health crises needing to be written back into the history of public health, Supermassive Black Holes and Tidal Disruption Events in which black holes influence the evolution of entire galaxies, the Influenza Pandemic and Asian American Communities in Southern California from 1918 to 1941 in which some women of color participated in medical history in non-traditional ways, and mentoring young women of color in the STEM field particularly Materials Science & Engineering. The last American Fellowship recipient, Kelly Subramanian, Ph.D. from the University of California-Davis studying Cell Biology and Biology Education, received a partial grant from the Martinez Branch 50 year celebration endowment. She talked about how metabolic complexes are organized in mitochondrial cells and encouraged a continuation of undergraduate study in the sciences with an understanding of the features of research labs.

There were three international fellowship recipients, one from Kenya receiving her M.S. in Computer Science at Northeastern University who spoke about how artificial intelligence algorithms can be biased and discriminatory against women when applying for jobs, another from the Bahamas getting an M.S. in Bioengineering at UCLA who talked about coronary heart disease which is the leading cause of death in the Bahamas, beta blockers and targeted drug delivery that would clear up plaque build-up in the artery, and a young woman from Madagascar receiving her Ph.D. from UC Berkeley in Integrative Biology who spoke about how the decline of animal populations, particularly mouse lemurs, affect the rejuvenation of forests in Madagascar. One Career Development Grant recipient spoke about managing equitable college enrollment in marginalized communities. A Research Publication Grant Recipient spoke about heat shock proteins in treating neurological disorders and trying to develop drugs to treat COVID-19 and block the entry of COVID into our systems. Finally, a Community Action Grant recipient who works for the Boys & Girls Clubs of Oceanside spoke about targeting a 100% graduation rate for its club participants and engaging girls in STREAM Labs which focus on Science, Technology, *Research*, Engineering, Art and Math. It was inspiring to listen to these women who are all doing such important work in their areas of study.

The Fund Committee will be doing a Kinder's Fundraiser between November 15 and December 13, 2021. It will look a little different this year. Instead of selling coupon vouchers for a choice of sandwiches and a small drink, we will be selling \$20 gift cards. Our branch will receive \$4.50 for each gift card we sell. These gift cards can be used at **ANY** of Kinder's seven Bay Area locations and can be used toward **ANY** menu item. These gift cards make excellent stocking stuffer gifts for the holidays and do NOT expire. A mail order form is included in this newsletter. TECH TREK TIDINGS

Great news! At this point in time, it is full speed ahead for Tech Trek Camp Sonoma. Plans are underway in preparing for on-site camps throughout California. Our branch Tech Trek Committee will be making contact with our four middle schools, Martinez JH, Valley View Middle, Pleasant Hill Middle and Sequoia Middle School in December. We are requesting space for 6 spots with one alternate, 7 grade girls going into 8th grade. As in past camps we have asked the girls to indicate proof of MMR vaccination, now we will be adding proof of Covid-19 vaccination. The camp is scheduled for late June, cost to be determined, it was \$1000 per camper in 2019.

We will be doing some fundraising in the future and asking for donations. Remember Tech Trek is classified as a special fund and your donation is tax deductible. Checks should be made out to AAUW CA SPF, Tech Trek. I also want to remind you that if any of you are giving money to Tech Trek from an IRA account as a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD), that they must be in to SPF by December 1, 2021 to insure that they can be counted for the 2021 tax year. The date is to give SPF time to make sure the deposits are made before 12/31/2021, as required by law for QCDs. So, checks must be written and delivered to Trinka before Thanksgiving.

As camp director I will be looking for members who would like to volunteer, as dorm moms or class monitors. You might also have ideas of potential STEM workshops or professional women as inspirational speakers. Please feel free to contact me if your wish to be part of the team or have any suggestions or questions.

We were pleased to hear from several of the Virtual 2021 campers at our brunch in September. I would like to thank the girls for sharing their experiences and answering our many questions. Updates from AAUW California Public Policy Committee

Abortion Justice

Although the constitutionally-guaranteed right to an abortion has been systematically under attack for decades, it is currently in danger of disappearing altogether. As AAUW National recently noted, "Every person should have the ability to make their own informed decisions regarding their reproductive life. It is beyond time for abortion to be secured legally, funded fully, and equitably available for all who need it, when they need it, without shame or stigma." With the recent refusal of the U.S. Supreme Court to intervene in the onerous Texas case, it is clear that we can no longer count on the courts to protect this critical right. Congress must pass the Women's Health Protection Act. Watch for Action Alerts from National, use them to keep pressure on your representatives, and sign-up now for the 2-Minute Activist if you haven't already done so by clicking here https://www.aauw.org/act/two-minute-activist/.

Legislative Updates

Our last five priority bills that were awaiting the Governor's signature have been acted on, here are the results

SB 62 (requires fair pay, instead of "by the piece" payment, for garment workers) **SIGNED**

AB 367 (free menstrual products must be provided in girls/women's bathrooms in schools) SIGNED

AB 887 (allows domestic violence restraining orders to be filed electronically) SIGNED

AB 123 (increases paid family leave benefits to 65 – 75% of regular pay) **VETOED**

AB 1074 (requires hotel and janitorial workers who have lost their jobs due the pandemic to be prioritized for hiring as businesses reopen) **VETOED**

Economic Equity

October 21st is Latina Equal Pay Day – the day Latina women, who are paid just 57 cents to every white male's dollar, finally catch up from the previous year. To help raise awareness, our coalition partner Stronger California is hosting a Latina Equal Pay Day & Essential Women Workers Virtual Summit.
